27,101 Location: Midsomer Norton	The BSA Superstar, a full size underlever with an interesting rotating breach. This one is in .22 caliber.











I'll have to admit Its an air gun I know little about so I won't pretend I do. A little digging on the serial number. RH prefix puts its as a 22 from 1990-2004. I'm guessing it's an earlier rather than later model.



It comes with iron sights of good quality, fully adjustable for elevation and windage. It's a large rifle but doesn't feel as heavy as say a HW77 to me. The stock is attractive and feels a good shape to hold, the monte carlo cheek piece and slightly raised comb suggests it is designed for scope use too. A raised rail with arrestor holes is parked atop the cylinder for mounting of optics. On the right side of the cylinder is the bsa manual safety that can be set to S/F as you wish.

Onto using the rifle. Dan informs me this is not running standard internals. A Welsh willy kit has been fitted and an Aussie seal on the piston.

(An important note) - the rotating breach must not be opened unless the rifle has been cocked. It damages the seals as I understand so the process is pressing the button on end of underlever to release. Pull through the stroke, return the lever then slide the breach open to load the pellet. Once pellet is seated, rotate the breach to close. The cocking stroke feels quite long but by no means hard going. Pretty smooth and low effort



I found the breach a bit strange to load to begin with. But it's a clever design. When you think about it as you don't have to hold the lever when loading as it's allready been clipped back up. Does have a few advantages over sliding breaches. I'm thinking no chance of Injury or a noisy bear trap.

Shooting.

I did a few test shots and it certainly shoots well. Hard to go into too much detail here as its barely had many shots through is since the internals have been rebuilt. Recoil feels good, no twang or anything like that. Once I've shot a bit more lead through it I'll get onto some chrono strings.

First up today (as I was eager to try it out) I wanted to put a few shots on paper. Setting up the iron sights. Those will get a very good test before some scoped use at a later date.


I will do a little pellet testing as well but my hunch based on a slightly older supersport is that RWS superdomes work well. I set up a few targets at 15 meters and shot 2 groups once point of impact was getting on bull. Still some adjustments to be made to the open sights but heres my first results. Shows promise I'd say.




